WITH THE WOMEN OF TODAY

To have settled 8,000 disputes between husbands and wives and to have 70,000 more under observation is quite a record for one lone woman. Mrs. Josephine H. Lawrence, assistant superintendent of the social service department in the Cook county court, Chicago, believes she is the only woman to hold such record.

In the eight years in which she has been superintendent and assistant superintendent of the social service department, she has settled 8,000 marital disputes as well as attending to the other duties of her office. She organized the department beginning with a pad and pencil and appointing herself arbiter of family quarrels. Today she has over 70,000 cases under observation.

It is said that Mrs. Lawrence settled eighty per cent of the family troubles which otherwise would end in divorce and that she has saved Cook county hundreds of thousands of dollars. She is really assistant to the county judge, for all cases for a certain nature are investigated by her before they go to the judge. If she fails to get satisfaction the case goes to court.
